














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
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5 MUST-SEE PLACES IN COPENHAGEN

Nyhavn stands as Copenhagen's most photographed landmark, where colorful 17th-century townhouses line a picturesque canal. Once a bustling commercial port, it's now home to charming restaurants and cafés where Hans Christian Andersen once lived and

wrote.

Tivoli Gardens offers enchanting experiences year-round as one of the world's oldest amusement parks. Beyond thrilling rides, visitors discover beautiful gardens, open-air concerts, and seasonal celebrations that capture the Danish spirit of celebration.

The Little Mermaid Statue pays homage to Andersen's beloved fairy tale. While modest in size, this bronze sculpture represents Copenhagen's literary heritage and offers scenic harbor views.

Rosenborg Castle houses the Danish Crown Jewels and provides insight into royal history through its Renaissance architecture and meticulously preserved rooms showcasing four centuries of Danish monarchy.



Christiansborg Palace serves as the seat of Danish government while offering public access to royal reception rooms, ruins beneath the palace, and tower views over the city.



Copenhagen boasts 17 Michelin-starred restaurants, more per capita than most European cities. Noma, consistently ranked among the world's best restaurants, revolutionized Nordic cuisine with its innovative approach.

Smørrebrød (open-faced sandwiches) remains Denmark's culinary signature. Traditional toppings include pickled herring, roast beef, and Danish cheese. Visit **Aamanns** for modern interpretations or **Schønnemann** for centuryold recipes.



Street food markets like Reffen and Torvehallerne offer diverse international cuisines at reasonable prices. Additionally, these venues showcase Copenhagen's multicultural dining landscape.

Hygge culture extends to cozy cafés serving exceptional coffee and Danish pastries. Meyers Bageri and Lagkagehuset provide authentic Danish baking experiences.

SWEDEN

If sauna culture is part of the Swedish psyche, then Hestraviken Hotell & Spa embraces it with sophistication. Set in Småland's forested heart beside the Nissan River, near Lake Algustorpasjön and the trails of Isaberg, this early-20th-century hotel captures the essence of Nordic wellbeing.





At its Riverside Spa, guests move between saunas, warm outdoor pools and invigorating cold plunges in the river — a rhythmic dance of heat and refreshment. The hotel also arranges nature-based experiences from hiking to gentle outdoor excursions, all designed to reconnect body and mind. Guest rooms are housed in timbered lodges and cottages that blend naturally into the forested setting, while the restaurant listed in Sweden's White Guide — showcases local produce and seasonal flavours. As dusk settles, the spa's soft light and scent of pine create a cocoon of warmth against the crisp air outside.









ITALY

Thermal tradition at Abano Ritz Hotel Terme

For centuries, travellers have journeyed to Abano Terme, just outside Padua, in search of the region's fabled healing waters. Today, the **Abano Ritz Hotel Terme** continues that legacy — a family-run sanctuary steeped in Italian spa culture and old-world refinement.

The hotel's twin thermal pools are fed by ancient volcanic springs, their mineral-rich waters held at around 33°C. Guests drift between the indoor and outdoor pools beneath rising steam, then

move on to fango mud therapies or revitalising massages in the hotel's calm treatment rooms. Beyond the waters, Abano Ritz retains its nostalgic grandeur: elegant lounges and period rooms, with outlooks to the Euganean Hills. It's an environment where time stretches — designed for lingering conversations, quiet reading and slow aperitifs.





Hidden sanctuary at Talaria Resort & SpA

POLAND

East of Warsaw, <u>Talaria Resort & Spa</u> rests within the peaceful countryside of Trojanów. Once a 19th-century noble residence, the palace has been reimagined as a wellness retreat surrounded by parkland and lakes. Inside, the spa's Finnish and steam saunas, jacuzzis and indoor pool create a tranquil rhythm of warmth and calm. The resort is known for its relaxed, feminine atmosphere and

weekend women-only wellness concept, focusing on balance, rest and natural therapies.

The landscape itself contributes to the serenity: misty gardens, gentle rivers and a sense of rural stillness that feels far removed from city life. At Talaria, time slows to the pace of your own breathing.





CZECH REPUBLIC

<u>Chateau Liblice</u> stands as a four-star wellness retreat within a Baroque castle, where centuries of noble heritage meet contemporary spa luxury. Once home to countesses and aristocrats, now owned by the Czech Academy of Sciences, the property preserves its historical grandeur through traditional furnishings and period architecture.





The spa exemplifies European wellness standards with Finnish saunas, whirlpool baths, hydro-massage showers and a sun parlour. Treatments range from herbal wraps to the signature chocolate massage—a culinary approach to relaxation. The castle's restaurant specializes in fine dining, completing the experience of refined hospitality.

At Chateau Liblice, history breathes through every hall, inviting guests to slow down and be revitalized inside and out.

Alpine serenity at Hotel Villa Kastelruth



ITALY

At the foot of the Sciliar and the Alpe di Siusi, Hotel Villa Kastelruth rests within the legendary UNESCO-protected Dolomites. Founded in 1903 as an alpine nursing home and recently renovated, the property blends Tyrolean tradition with modern wellness comforts.

The 15-meter heated outdoor pool stretches toward the mountain panorama, while two spectacular saunas frame the peaks through floor-to-ceiling windows. An outdoor jacuzzi and intimate relaxation room complete the spa experience, offering tranquility with every view. Tyrolean cuisine anchors the dining experience, and the seasons shape the rhythm here—summer brings guided excursions into the Italian Alps, winter delivers world-class skiing terrain. At Villa Kastelruth, the Dolomites are not just scenery but an invitation to both movement and rest.




STAGE 1

KRAKÓW – THE HEART OF POLAND'S PAST

Fly into Kraków, the country's cultural capital, and spend two days absorbing its intoxicating mix of Gothic, Renaissance and Baroque architecture. Begin in the Old Town, a UNESCO-listed labyrinth of cobbled streets that spiral out from Rynek Główny, Europe's largest medieval square. Watch the bugler's call from St Mary's Basilica, duck into the Cloth Hall for amber trinkets, and seek out the tucked-away Czartoryski Museum to glimpse Leonardo da Vinci's Lady with an Ermine.

A visit to Kazimierz, the old Jewish quarter, is essential. By day, explore the poignant history at the Galicia Jewish Museum; by night, hop between cosy vodka bars and candlelit restaurants serving plump pierogi and steaming bowls of żurek.



For those interested in venturing beyond the city, a day trip to the Wieliczka Salt Mine offers an extraordinary underground world carved from rock salt, complete with chapels, chandeliers, and centuries of mining history.





Hotel Polski Pod Białym Orłem in the heart of Kraków is an ideal place to stop. One of the city's most historic hotels, it stands across from the medieval defense walls where local artists now display their work. For nearly 200 years, this cherished retreat has welcomed guests into uniquely designed rooms, each with its own distinctive character—a stay infused with history and charm in beautiful Kraków's center.

Alternatively, choose <u>Sieraków Manor</u>, a refined countryside retreat just 30 minutes from the city center. Dating back to 1847, this historic estate sits within four hectares of peaceful parkland, offering English-style rooms where traces of the past live on in period furniture and art. The restaurant, recommended by Slow Food Polska, serves exceptional cuisine alongside the largest wine collection in the Małopolska region—a tranquil escape before hitting the road again.

POZNAŃ – A CITY OF HERITAGE AND MODERN CHARM

A five-hour drive west delivers you to Poznań, Poland's oft-overlooked gem. The pastel-hued Old Market Square, dominated by an ornate Renaissance Town Hall, is a feast for the eyes. Time your visit to midday to witness the city's famous mechanical goats butt heads. Stroll along the Warta River, where industrial warehouses have transformed into craft breweries and buzzing art spaces. The Imperial Castle, once built for Kaiser Wilhelm II, now houses art galleries, an arthouse cinema and some of Poland's best coffee spots.

Outside the city, Rogalin Palace offers a glimpse into Polish aristocratic life, while the Malta Lake area is perfect for a leisurely bike ride or boat trip



Pałac Lucja

There are plenty of historic stays and detours to enjoy on the drive to Poznań.

<u>Pałac Lucja</u> in Zakrzów village offers a striking butteryellow retreat set in acres of lush parkland, where nature meets history and top-tier hospitality delivers great food and service within minutes of each room—an escape to truly switch off.

WHERE TO STAY

Hotel Debowy in Poland's Lower Silesian region features 36 rooms across two stunning period residences with Art Nouveau elements. At the foothills of the Owl Mountains and surrounded by epic hiking trails, it balances relaxing tranquility with outdoor adventure.

Pałac Wojanów, nestled in the Karkonosze Mountains of Lower Silesia, is a meticulously restored 13th-century palace set within 16 hectares of parkland. With 81 unique rooms, the Garden Restaurant, and a spa, this enchanting estate combines modern luxury with timeless romance and breathtaking surroundings.

Pałac Wiechlice rests in the enchanting Borów Dolnośląskich region—an 18th-century retreat nestled among ancient trees, offering luxurious apartments, a stylish restaurant, and a grand ballroom where elegance meets tranquility.

Olandia is also a great option: a charming historic estate in the village of Pruism, an hour west of Poznań. Surrounded by the Land of 100 Lakes within Sieraków Landscape Park and the Noteć Forest, it offers 60 comfortable rooms, a slow food restaurant, a cosy wine cellar, and a spa with massages and beauty treatments—pure air, greenery, and peace.



KOŁOBRZEG – THE BALTIC ESCAPE

Head north to the Baltic coast, swapping city spires for the briny air of Kołobrzeg, a spa town famed for its sea breeze and sandy beaches. Stroll along the pier, breathe in the iodine-rich air and take in the town's historic lighthouse. The Museum of Polish Arms provides an unexpectedly fascinating dive into Poland's turbulent history.

For a more immersive seaside experience, take a boat tour along the coast or cycle the scenic Baltic Trail, which winds past dunes, forests, and charming fishing villages.



WHERE TO STAY

Manowce Palace, a five-star mansion overlooking the Szczecin Lagoon, offering luxury and seclusion. This neoclassical beauty sits hidden within dense forest on the shores of Western Pomerania—a true refuge from modern life. Inside, elegant antiques and paintings blend seamlessly with contemporary furniture creating opulent suites and comfortable apartments. Inviting gardens and a contemporary sauna complete the estate, where breathtaking architecture meets tranquil forest surroundings.



GDYNIA & GDAŃSK – POLAND'S MARITIME MAJESTY

Follow the coast east to the Tricity region, home to Gdynia, Sopot and Gdańsk. Gdynia, a port city with a modernist soul, is Poland's gateway to the sea. Walk the seafront boulevard, explore the Emigration Museum, and admire the streamlined architecture that speaks to its interwar heyday. Then, on to Gdańsk, a city that carries the weight of history. Stroll down Długi Targ, past pastel townhouses and the imposing Neptune's Fountain. Learn about the Solidarity movement at the strikingly designed European Solidarity Centre, before retreating to a harbourside bar for a glass of locally brewed gold-hued beer.

For a quieter coastal experience, head to the Hel Peninsula, a thin stretch of land that juts into the Baltic, offering pristine beaches and excellent windsurfing.

WHERE TO STAY



Uphagen Manor House, a beautifully restored four-star manor offering a historical yet comfortable stay. Located in the heart of Gdańsk's historic Dolne Miasto district—a revitalized neighborhood by the Motława River—this property sits just steps from the city's Downtown and Old Town. More than a hotel, it is a space filled with character and stories, where interiors preserve the past while embracing the present.



MASURIAN LAKE DISTRICT – A BREATH OF FRESH AIR

Turning inland, leave the Baltic behind for the Masurian Lake District, Poland's answer to Scandinavia's lakelands. Mrągowo, with its shimmering lakes and dense forests, is an outdoor enthusiast's dream. Hire a kayak, take a slow boat across the water, or simply soak up the silence in this under-explored paradise.

History buffs should visit the Wolf's Lair, Hitler's wartime headquarters on the Eastern front hidden deep in the forest, while nature lovers can enjoy the Pisz Forest, a haven for birdwatching and hiking.

WHERE TO STAY

Stops along the way from the coast to the lake district include <u>Hotel Zamek Gniew</u>, a majestic fortress steeped in Polish history. Once the seat of kings and knights, this extraordinary castle in northwestern Poland now complements its heritage with modern comfort—offering luxurious accommodation, spa treatments, family activities and romantic dining amidst picturesque grounds where history meets luxury.

Pałac Mortegi Hotel & SPA, nestled in the peaceful village of Mortegi in northern Poland, brings together history and elegance. Fifty beautifully designed rooms and suites exude noble charm, while the tranquil spa area and restaurant offer the perfect escape to relax and rejuvenate, surrounded by stunning landscapes.


An hour's detour east of the region will bring you to <u>Mioduński Dworek</u>, a charming 19th-century Prussian manor house overlooking Lake Szymon in the stunning Masurian Lake District. Built by descendants of philosopher Johan Gottlieb and now run by the Białobrzeski family, this historic retreat immerses visitors in the region's natural beauty and cultural heritage through its cozy guesthouse, where every detail reflects a deep connection to place.

WARSAW – A CAPITAL OF CONTRASTS

The final stretch of the journey takes you south to Warsaw, a city that wears its scars with defiant elegance. Levelled in World War II and painstakingly rebuilt, its Old Town is a remarkable feat of resilience. But Warsaw is no living museum – this is a city of contrasts, where communist-era tower blocks stand beside glass skyscrapers, and where pierogi-filled milk bars coexist with Michelinstarred restaurants.

Explore the edgy Praga district, visit the POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews, and toast to the end of the trip in a rooftop bar overlooking the neon-lit skyline. If time allows, Wilanów Palace, the 'Polish Versailles,' is a must-see, as is the Royal Łazienki Park, where peacocks roam beside neoclassical pavilions.





Choose from <u>Jaworowy Dwór</u>, 50 km north of the city—a family-run 18th-century manor nestled in the heart of Mazovia and surrounded by tranquil fields and forests. Lovingly restored, this serene retreat offers 20 uniquely designed stylish rooms that combine classic elegance with modern comfort, complemented by authentic furniture, an outdoor pool, and a restaurant.

Alternatively, Palace Mała Wieś, a historic palace on the outskirts of Warsaw, offers a final dose of grandeur before departure. Set within serene 18th-century gardens, this enchanting retreat features 54 boutique rooms and luxury apartments, gourmet cuisine, a spa, and live music—creating an unforgettable ambiance where history meets indulgence.

A two-hour drive south returns you to Kraków, completing the loop. From medieval Kraków to Baltic beaches, from the urban energy of Warsaw to the serenity of Masurian lakes, this Polish odyssey is proof that Poland is so much more than the sum of its postcards. It's a country that rewards the curious, the wanderers, and the road-trippers willing to go beyond the usual tourist trails. Each stop on this journey is an opportunity to step deeper into Poland's rich and complex history, to savour its regional flavours, and to experience the landscapes that shape its identity. With castles, lakes, coastline, and dynamic cities along the way, this road trip offers an immersive way to experience the best of Poland, past and present.









Vienna, Austria

Lisbon, Portugal

Locals love the nostalgic tingles they're showered in while wandering Viennese Christmas markets. The wafting scent of cookies takes them back to grandma's kitchen, as does the hearty goulash, flavour-crammed sausages and Lángos (Hungarian deep-fried dough). You'll love it too – head to Karlsplatz right in front of St. Charles Church to experience one of the best Christmas markets in Austria. You won't find tacky souvenirs here – just genuinely unique arts and crafts, warming mulled wine and even a place to build straw castles with the kids.

WHERE TO STAY?

<u>Hotel Stefanie</u> is the oldest hotel in the city and full of charm – wrapping you up in old-world guest rooms, lip-smacking wiener schnitzels and lashings of Viennese 'Schmäh'.



Did somebody say Christmas cake? It's Portugal's speciality at this time of the year. Foodies must try the bolo rei king cake – a festive pastry stuffed with fruit that you can sample at Lisbon's Natal E Na Fil market. Every year, Lisbon's centre is drenched with magical lights and graced with a glorious tree, which look fairytale-like surrounded by chocolate-box style market stalls selling toys and gifts galore.

WHERE TO STAY?

Round-off a day of festivities in a beautiful bed at <u>As</u> <u>Janelas Verdes</u>, a charming 18th-century mansion in the heart of the capital.







Prague, Czech Republic

Milan, Italy

Prague looks made for Christmas. Gothic towers rise above twinkling streets, choirs sing beneath Baroque facades, and the aroma of cinnamon, honey and roasted chestnuts fills the air. The city's main market, in Old Town Square, is one of Europe's most beloved — centred around a giant Christmas tree and wooden stalls selling traditional ornaments, handmade toys, and trdelník, a pastry rolled in sugar and nuts.

Smaller markets in Wenceslas Square and near Prague Castle offer quieter corners to explore, with mulled wine served in painted mugs and live folk music in the background.

WHERE TO STAY?

Retreat from the festive crowds to <u>Villa Lanna</u>, a neo-Renaissance villa set in peaceful gardens just north of the Old Town. Perfect for those who want the beauty of Prague by day and calm elegance by night.



Milan is home to several alluring Christmas Markets, but the Mercatino di Natale in Piazza Duomo (Piazza Duomo Christmas Market), with its spectacular Christmas tree, is undoubtedly one of the most picturesque. In front of the city's mighty Duomo cathedral, the market is home to over 60 wooden chalets selling all kinds of delightful ornaments and sweet and savoury treats. Grab a firunatt, a long necklace of smoked chestnuts, before exploring the square behind the Duomo. Here you'll find lines of wooden huts filled to the brim with decorations, delicacies and tasty Italian produce, from local cheeses and preservatives to cured meats and wines.great day out.

WHERE TO STAY?

Centrally located is the magnificent **Grand Hotel et de Milan**, a 19th-century building only minutes walk from La Scala theatre – a must-go for opera buffs.







Zagreb, Croatia

Ljubljana, Slovenia

Zagreb's Advent celebrations have earned it the title of Europe's Best Christmas Market more than once — and for good reason. From late November, the entire city transforms into a glowing winter festival. At Zrinjevac Park, white-topped stalls line the avenues, selling handmade decorations, local sausages, and sweet fritule doughnuts. King Tomislav Square hosts a vast open-air ice rink surrounded by fairy lights, while street musicians fill the air with festive melodies.

Locals gather over hot chocolate and mulled wine, and the mood is infectious — warm, relaxed, and full of life.

WHERE TO STAY?

Right in the heart of the capital, <u>Hotel Capital</u> offers Art Deco sophistication and an unbeatable location. After an evening of carols and lights, unwind with a nightcap at the hotel's elegant bar before retreating to your room's marble-lined calm.



Slovenia's capital and largest city, Ljubljana, is rich in history and culture and often wrongly overlooked as a festive destination. Come December, Ljubljanas' Prešeren Square is decorated with twinkling lights and a generous helping of festive cheer. Browse the Christmas stalls that line the banks of River Ljubljanica, sip warm mulled wine and lose yourself in the medieval streets of this storied spot. You can even take a funicular ride up to Ljubljana Castle for picture-perfect vistas over the city.

WHERE TO STAY?

There's no better place for a Christmas escape than the romantic **Antiq Palace**, a 16th-century boutique stay in the very heart of the city.







Setúbal, Portugal

Meran, Italy

If you like your Christmas a little warmer, Setúbal is a delight. Just south of Lisbon, this coastal town combines festive charm with Atlantic breezes. The main market in Praça de Bocage brims with local crafts, nativity scenes and regional sweets like filhós (fried pastries with cinnamon and sugar). The waterfront lights glimmer against fishing boats, while open-air concerts and choirs fill the squares with music.

Setúbal's mild climate means you can sip hot chocolate outdoors or walk the beach at sunset before heading to an evening market. It's Christmas with a distinctly Portuguese twist — colourful, joyful and relaxed.

WHERE TO STAY?

Rio Art Hotel is a stylish, art-inspired hotel in the centre of town, perfect for soaking up the festive atmosphere. Its bright interiors and contemporary comfort provide a refreshing contrast to the winter markets, while cafés, restaurants, and the waterfront are all within easy reach.



Framed by snow-capped peaks in South Tyrol, Meran feels like the set of a Christmas film. The town's market, held along the Passer Promenade, is lined with wooden chalets selling local crafts, Alpine cheeses, and steaming cups of vin brulé. The scent of pine and cinnamon drifts through the crisp air as choirs sing beneath twinkling trees.

Meran combines Italian style with Austrian tradition — think strudel and espresso, brass bands and opera singers. It's also a gateway to the surrounding mountains for winter walks or spa days in the town's thermal baths.

WHERE TO STAY?

<u>Hotel Villa Westend</u> sits gracefully by the river, just steps from the market. Its Belle Époque architecture and warm hospitality make it the ideal winter retreat — elegant yet relaxed, with views of both the river and the snow-covered Alps.

SWEDEN'S TIMELESS HOTEL TREASURES





Sweden's history isn't only preserved in museums and palaces — it lives on in its hotels. Across the country, manor houses, villas, castles and questhouses have been reimagined for modern travellers, offering more than a night's rest. Each carries the imprint of centuries past: stories of noble families, monastic traditions, industrial pioneers and the cultural shifts that shaped Sweden. Staying in one of these properties is less about luxury and more about stepping into a narrative. From west coast villas to lakeside castles and highland retreats, here are ten hotels where heritage remains vivid and alive.

Sundbyholm Castle

Eskilstuna, Södermanland



Standing on the edge of Lake Mälaren, <u>Sundbyholm Castle</u> was built between 1639 and 1648 by Admiral Carl Gyllenhielm, son of King Charles IX. Its grounds once belonged to a medieval monastery, and nearby lies the Sigurd Carving, one of Sweden's most important Viking rune stones. Guests today stay not in the castle itself but in historic outbuildings across the estate — from the Coachman's Quarters to suites with garden terraces. The castle halls serve as dining and gathering spaces, their interiors recalling centuries of history. With a sandy beach, marina and lakeside paths nearby, Sundbyholm unites heritage with natural beauty.





Lyckorna, West Coast

Built in 1901 as the summer home of industrialist Carl Emil Haeger, <u>Villa Sjötorp</u> is a wooden seaside villa that captures the elegance of Sweden's turn-of-the-century architecture. Its carved gables, dragon-head details and Arts & Crafts interiors reflect an era when craftsmanship mattered, setting the tone for a hotel steeped in heritage.

The restaurant champions local produce, sourcing seafood from the Bohuslän coast and vegetables from nearby farms — earning recognition in Sweden's White Guide.

Overlooking the Skagerrak, with a garden that runs to the sea, it offers a stay shaped by the coastal landscape that defines life here.



Vittaryd, Småland

Founded in 1389 by Jöns Skötta of the Stenbock family, <u>Toftaholm Manor</u> has long been a place of power, refuge and legend. The current manor house, built in 1871, stands beside older estate buildings, including the 1640 inn Den Gyllene Abborren with its vaulted cellar and open fires. Stories abound: King Gustav Vasa is said to have met his third wife Katarina Stenbock here, while folklore tells of a tunnel linking the estate to a ruined medieval fort nearby. Guests today relax in wood-fired hot tubs by Lake Vidöstern or in individually styled rooms that mix manor-house elegance with comfort. The resident ghost, Mats, adds a final layer of lore to this centuries-old Småland estate.



Few hotels can claim a setting as rich in history as Vadstena Klosterhotel. Once a royal palace, it became a Bridgettine monastery in the 14th century.

Today, it offers the rare chance to stay within one of Sweden's most significant medieval landmarks. Rooms span historic buildings, some

with vaulted ceilings and thick stone walls that echo centuries gone by. The spa draws on monastic calm, with treatments and spaces for reflection. Just steps away lie Lake Vättern, Vadstena Abbey and cobbled streets reminders that this is more than a hotel, but living Swedish heritage.

Två Skyttlar

Örby, Västra Götaland

On the shores of Lake Västra Öresjön, Två Skyttlar has grown from modest origins into a family-run countryside retreat. The main building began as a poorhouse in the 1880s, before three local weavers opened a café here in 1950, calling it Tre Skyttlar — "Three Shuttles." When one left, the name became Två Skyttlar, and it has remained ever since. Later transformed into a course centre and hotel, it still reflects that spirit of community and craft. Guests stay in light-filled rooms with forest and lake views, dine on dishes from local farms and the kitchen garden, and unwind in wood-fired saunas and hot tubs by the water.







Dating back to 1798, **Stufvenäs Gästgifveri** began as guest lodgings for nearby Värnanäs Manor, once home to families linked with Gustav Vasa's dynasty. Yet history here runs deeper: archaeological finds reveal settlement over 5,000 years old. Inside, original floors, tiled stoves and doors remain, while careful renovations have expanded it into a respected countryside hotel. Known for gastronomy, the inn highlights Småland produce, and its rebuilt wine cellar has earned international recognition. A spa overlooking the coast offers renewal, while the surrounding Örarevet Nature Reserve brings beaches, oak groves and birdlife. Stufvenäs unites tradition, history and comfort.

Tällbergsgårdens Hotel

Tällberg, Dalarna

High above Lake Siljan in the timber village of Tällberg, this hotel reflects the cultural heart of Dalarna. The site once housed the village school before Johansson's boarding house opened here in 1908. Inside, heritage remains central: red-painted timber walls, kurbits-style folk paintings and decorative panels that evoke local traditions. Johansson's Restaurant, rated in the White Guide, serves seasonal menus with lake views, continuing a century-long tradition of hospitality. Tällbergsgården Hotel is more than a hotel: it's a window into Dalarna's folk art, storytelling and enduring sense of place.



Wallby Säteri

Vetlanda, Småland)

Wallby Säteri is a corner of countryside calm—an old manor with deep roots and open doors, tucked among the hills and stone walls of Skirö in Småland. Just beyond the tree-lined avenue, guests will find red-painted cottages, walking trails, a private lake, and a wood-fired sauna.



Whether visitors arrive to recharge or reconnect, Wallby balances stillness with inspiration. The estate hosts everything from quiet getaways to lively gatherings, offering cosy accommodation, generous meals in the manor restaurant, and meeting spaces with plenty of daylight and room to think.

The land has been settled since the 14th century, and while much has changed, the spirit of care remains. Wallby isn't polished or formal—it's personal. A place to breathe, reflect, or simply enjoy the view with no rush to be anywhere else.



Ekerö, Lake Mälaren

Set on the island landscape of Ekerö, Skytteholm Nordi Spa traces its origins to Johan Skytte, a 17th-century statesman and royal tutor. The manor was reshaped in the early 1900s, but its historic heart is now paired with a contemporary Nordic Spa. Guests follow elemental rituals by the lakeshore: wood-fired saunas and hot tubs under the sky, heated pools, and lounges for rest. Accommodation balances manor-house elegance with modern simplicity. while surrounding forests and trails connect visitors with nature. Close to UNESCO-listed Drottningholm Palace, Skytteholm is both heritage estate and wellness retreat — where Sweden's past endures, yet calm and balance prevail.



OLD WALLS, **NEW STORIES**



HISTORIC STAYS ACROSS THE UK

In an age of sleek new openings and carbon-copy design hotels, it's the older walls that feel most alive. Across the United Kingdom, historic inns, manor houses and coastal retreats are writing new chapters without losing their past. Whether it's a centuries-old pub reborn as a foodie hideaway or a Georgian home turned boutique guesthouse, these are places where time lingers — and comfort comes with character.



ENGLAND: INNS WITH HISTORY AND HEART

THE KING'S HEAD INN

Bledington, Cotswolds



If ever there were a scene to bottle English village life, Bledington's green would be it: stone cottages, ducks on the brook, the gentle clang of the church bell. The King's Head Inn sits at its centre, a honey-hued landmark offering log fires, local ales and rooms that marry simplicity with style. Owners Archie and Nicola Orr-Ewing have restored its reputation as one of the Cotswolds' most beloved dining pubs, celebrating produce from nearby farms. After a long walk on the Oxfordshire Way, there's no finer sight than the inn glowing gold in the evening light.



SHIBDEN MILL INN

Halifax, West Yorkshire

III II ID - IIII

Hidden down a wooded lane in the Shibden Valley, this 17th-century corn mill has perfected the art of the warm northern welcome. Shibden Mill Inn pairs old beams and low ceilings with gentle refinement: crisp linens, local artworks and quietly confident cooking. Its connection to place runs deep — the moorland paths of West Yorkshire are right outside, while nearby Shibden Hall tells the story of Anne Lister, the remarkable 19th-century diarist whose life has inspired modern audiences. Here, history feels close enough to touch.

THE BRISLEY BELL

Norfolk

On a crossroads north of Dereham, The **Brisley Bell** looks like a textbook country pub: whitewashed brick, woodburning fires, friendly chatter at the bar. Yet everything has been thoughtfully tuned — from Norfolk cheeses and Cromer crab on the menu to light-filled garden rooms tucked behind the main building. Owners Marcus Seaman and Amelia Nicholsson have created a spot where locals linger and travellers return. It's the kind of inn that makes a weekend away feel both indulgent and reassuringly familiar.



In the Shropshire countryside, **The Hundred House** charms with its gentle eccentricity — beams, blooms and the hum of conversation from a dining room that champions its own kitchen garden. The Phillips family have tended it for decades, cultivating an atmosphere that's less hotel, more home with

exceptional cooking. Ludlow's markets and Ironbridge's industrial heritage are within reach, yet you could easily spend the day wandering the garden paths and sampling the herb-infused dishes grown metres from your table.

THE ROSE & CROWN

Romaldkirk, Teesdale

In picture-postcard Romaldkirk, where three greens meet beside a Saxon church, The Rose & Crown has welcomed travellers since 1733. This 18th-century inn is owned by the Robinson family and keeps things beautifully simple: fires that actually crackle, a bar locals love, and 14 bedrooms spread between the main inn, ground-floor courtyard rooms and the 17th-century Monk's Cottage. Come for Teesdale walks (High Force, Raby Castle within striking distance), stay for careful, seasonal cooking and the sense that time moves differently here.






THE INN AT WHITEWELL

Clitheroe, Lancashire

To many, **The Inn at Whitewell** is the definitive English inn. Set above the River Hodder amid the wild beauty of the Forest of Bowland, it's a jumble of stone buildings with deep armchairs, roaring fires and the comforting rhythm of country life. Rooms are big and individual, food is generous and honest, and the wine list is famously good.

The Tolkien Trail passes nearby, and the hills seem to begin at the doorstep. For all its accolades, Whitewell remains what it's always been: a place to rest, eat well and feel far from the rush of things.





SELKIRK ARMS HOTEL

Kirkcudbright, Dumfries & Galloway

In Kirkcudbright, Scotland's "artists' town," the Selkirk Arms Hotel has been hosting travellers since the 18th century. Robert Burns once stayed here, but the welcome feels as fresh as ever. The hotel's bright rooms, airy restaurant and fireside bar reflect the town's creative spirit — a balance of tradition and reinvention. Guests rise early for harbour walks or drives through the soft Galloway hills, returning to plates of local scallops or beef reared just up the road. Kirkcudbright remains one of Scotland's lesser-known corners, which is precisely why it's so rewarding.

NORTHERN IRELAND: GEORGIAN GRACE ON THE CAUSEWAY COAST

DROMORE HOUSE

Coleraine

Tucked among green fields near Coleraine, **Dromore House** proves that luxury doesn't need marble or mirrors to impress. Owner Angela Rolston has restored this Georgian house; there are four generously sized rooms filled with books, fabric textures and the scent of home-baked bread. Breakfasts are legendary — served leisurely and with conversation. The location is ideal for exploring Northern Ireland's spectacular north coast: the Giant's Causeway, Dunluce Castle, and Portstewart Strand are within easy reach, yet the house feels miles from the world. If you leave without promising to return, you're in the minority.

HOTEL L'HÉLIOS & SPA

MÉRIBEL, FRANCE

With panoramic views across the three spectacular peaks and valleys of Méribel, Hotel l'Helios & Spa is a luxurious experience from the moment you arrive. Perched at an altitude of 1,550m, this ski-in ski-out hotel is a snow lovers' dream. Roaring fires welcome you into this traditional chalet-style wood-clad building – especially dreamy in the winter but beautiful year-round. It's difficult to imagine a more idyllic spot for a long lunch than the sun-soaked

terrace at the Crêperie here, a quick detour off the Doron blue run. Dinner at l'Helios is a treat too, think beet leaf mille-feuille and roasted saddle of lamb, followed by rich chocolate mousse and Breton biscuits. Perfection. After a long day on the slopes, recharge and retreat to the glittering spa area for a soak in the pool or catch a movie in the on-site cinema.



NEW HELVETIA HOTEL

PLATRES, CYPRUS

The **New Helvetia Hotel** offers a unique mountain retreat in the picturesque Troodos Mountains. Founded in 1929 and now managed by its fourth generation, the hotel was proudly awarded the prestigious Historic Hotels of Cyprus label in 2024. Inspired by Swiss chalet architecture, the hotel is situated above the vigorous freshwater stream of the Kaledonia Waterfalls, providing guests with stunning views of the densely wooded gorge. It blends historical preservation with modern comforts, featuring unique elements like a 250-year-old pine tree growing through the roof of its Pine Tree Bar and a Veranda restaurant offering forest vistas. Guests have easy access to various mountain activities such as hiking, exploring nature trails, and winter sports in the surrounding Troodos region.



PYRHN PRIEL, UPPER AUSTRIA

Pops of Art Nouveau charm can still be seen within this recently renovated villa run by Markus and Christin Schmidleitner. Resting within the Totem and Sengsen ranges, the gorgeous Villa Bergzauber is surrounded by awe-inspiring mountain scenery. Guests here are encouraged to sit back and relax but if you do feel like exploring, check out the ancient beech woodlands in nearby Kalkalpen National Park. It's the largest forested area in Central Europe and a delight to behold. Alongside the main building accommodation, the hotel grounds are home to 10 design-led 'earth houses' that circle an inviting outdoor azure pool. These self-catering options are decked out with modern kitchens and stunning interiors and come complete with obligatory, breathtaking mountain views.

STÖRSATRA MOUNTAIN HOTEL

IDRE, SWEDEN



Opened in 1939, Storsätra Mountain Hotel is recognised as Dalarna's first alpine retreat. Founded by Margit Jonsson, it pioneered mountain hospitality in Sweden's southern highlands and still offers wilderness with warmth. Guests stay on a full-board basis, enjoying hearty meals and evenings by the fire, with time to unwind in a wood-fired sauna or

hot tub beside the Grövlan river. Winter brings over 100 kilometres of ski trails, while summer opens hiking routes into national parks across Sweden and Norway. Family-run to this day, Storsätra remains a gateway to adventure and a historic refuge in one of Sweden's most unspoilt landscapes.





HOTEL FALKEN WENGEN, SWITZERLAND

Jumpstart a new exercise regime in the heart of the Swiss Alps. High altitude holiday experiences see you working on endurance, strength and flexibility on the elevating peaks. Rest weary bones at Hotel Falken, which serves nourishing meals and mountain-view rooms to relax and power you through. The hotel's position in the car-free village makes it a skier and hikers' paradise, providing direct access to some of the most spectacular alpine terrain in the world.



KLOSTERS, SWITZERLAND

Welcome to Klosters, a quaint farmer's village, tucked away at the bottom of the Parsenn ski area in the heart of the Swiss Alps. It's here you'll find the Hotel Chesa Grischuna — a cosy mountain lodge that dates back to the 16th century. After a day of hiking or skiing in the alpine landscapes, relax in this historic hotel (a favourite with royals and Hollywood stars over the years) with a cup of hot chocolate or something a little stronger. Think cosy wooden interiors, roaring fires and impeccable Swiss hospitality perfection.

HOTEL LA STUA CAVALESE, ITALY



Hotel La Stua is located in the heart of Cavalese, in a charming house from the 1700s nestled in the oldest part of town near the Franciscan Friars' square. This secluded retreat showcases original frescoes and unique rooms, complemented by exceptional dining and warm family hospitality.

The sunny terrace offers stunning views of the Lagorai mountain chain and Pale di San Martino, while the historic center provides handcraft shops, wine bars, and quality restaurants. The Valle di Fiemme, a UNESCO World Heritage area, delivers year-round activities from skiing at Alpe Cermis and Latemar to hiking, mountain biking, and paragliding amid breathtaking alpine landscapes.

HOTEL CAVALLINO D'ORO

CASTELROTTO, ITALY

Cosy Tyrolean-style rooms whisper stories of a 700-year past at this quaint, alpine bolthole bordered by the extraordinary Italian Dolomites. Hotel Cavallino d'Oro is packed to the brim with history, ever present in the art and photography that adorns its walls. As fascinating as it is welcoming,

Cavallino is located in the heart of medieval Castelrotto, the largest town in the Alpe di Siusi. There's a hike to suit every level here - from easy walks to more taxing treks. 

YeeOn Boutique Hotel







Built on a historic 19th-century building in the heart of Gythio, this by-the-sea boutique hotel brings well-living to the center of its experience. Rated 9.8 by recent guests, YeeOn Boutique Hotel features modern rooms with private hammams, sea views, and an indoor rocky cave pool with sauna for relaxation. 


